OUR KIDS Washington Elks Therapy Program for Children, Inc. Our State Major Project



Keira is my <u>daughter</u> and she is 19 years old. Before we discovered the Washington Elks Therapy Program, Keira and I were two people struggling with our own challenges. Dealing with my own blindness and trying to help my daughter with a rare genetic disorder called TSC (Tuberous Sclerosis Complex) has been overwhelming and at times hopeless. It is through sheer luck that we came upon the Elks program.

For years we have been seeking the help of therapists and have been unsuccessful. Keira has sort of been in a state of limbo for many years. TSC has caused a wide range of medical issues which has affected her heart, brain, lungs, kidneys, liver and pancreas. She has developmental delays, selective mutism and anxiety interrupts the quality of her life each and every day. I remember some of her physicians telling me that some of her behavioral issues might not even respond to therapy. You can't always believe what you hear because when you get the right kind of help from someone with a particular set of skills there can be a recipe for success. We receive in-house services from an Elk therapist once a week. Keira has trouble expressing herself because of her selective mutism. Her occupational therapist has been able to read her body language which speaks volumes. We now know she has motor and sensory issues. In fact we will be seeking the help of a physical therapist because her left hip and knee are not in alignment. Keira's therapist is innovative, creative and treats Keira as an individual recognizing her neurodiversity. Her therapist is always exploring new ways and methods to help Keira to become more independent which would improve the quality of her life.

It was a struggle for us to find a program that would take Keira and when we <u>did</u> we couldn't afford it. Without the free services of the Washington Elks Therapy Program, Keira would not be where she is today. Thank you so much for making a difference in her life.

The Washington State Fair

It's time for, as most call it, the Puyallup Fair, so let's review some of it's past. The idea of a fair originated in June 1900. At that time a group of local businessmen, farmers and residents met to discuss the idea of a fair in the Puyallup Valley area. A board of directors was formed to govern the "Valley Fair" and it was decided the purpose of the fair was to be to advance the interests of agricultural, horticultural, dairying, stock raising, mining, and manufacturing industries of the Puyallup Valley. Shares of stock were sold to raise capital for the cost to start the fair on a vacant lot just west of where Pioneer Park is located today. The first Fair ran from October 4th thru the 6th in 1900. Cost was \$1 for a family for all three days.

The second Fair was moved up on the calendar to September 14-17 and was a day longer. As more room was needed, a 10-acre lot was purchased on the SW corner of 9th Avenue SW and Meridian. The most popular event at the Fair was horse racing. Horse racing at the Fair lasted until 1977, when it was discontinued due to concerns over the muddy track.

As the years went by the Fair grew in size and number of days it ran. Fairs were held annually until WWII when the Fairgrounds were used for the temporary facility within the system of internment camps for Japanese Americans, and referred to as Camp Harmony. This was the result of the attack on Pearl Harbor and President Roosevelt's Executive Order 9066. This order authorized the eviction of Japanese Americans from the West Coast. After the Japanese



Americans were moved elsewhere, the site was taken over by the Fort Lewis Ninth Service Command. This site was used for army training before solders were shipped out. The Fairgrounds remained closed to the public until after the end of the war. After much work to prepare the Fairgrounds for opening to the public, it opened again in September 1946.





The Fair continued to grow and add new attractions. On June 14, 1970, the Fairgrounds experienced a huge fire which damaged the grandstand, roller coaster, floral building, and caused the loss of some rides, restaurants, and concession stands. But, the Fair opened again in September 1970 with tents added for concession stands. By 1978, the Fair had grown to 46 acres and lasted 17 days.

Did you know the Skyride, left over from the Seattle World's Fair, was purchased and installed on the Fairgrounds in 1980?


As the years went by the Fairgrounds grew and rides became more sophisticated. The Extreme Scream ride was added in 1999 at a cost of \$2 million. The end of the decade finished with the Fair having an attendance of 1,238,029 and covering 160 acres. By the year 2000, the Fair celebrated its 100th Anniversary, and the cattle drive down Puyallup's Meridian St. and the Western Rodeo Parade had their first years.

The Fair has continued to grow and change annually as the years have passed. In 2020, the Fair was not held due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Fair returned in 2021. "Do the Puyallup."




